* Only edition. Intended to be a practical tool, Burn eliminated most of the definitions in Law-French found in earlier dictionaries. (They became obsolete when George II ordered the exclusive use of English in 1733.) This elimination cleared space for other material and longer entries. Indeed, Burn's articles on such subjects as judgment, jury, purchase and will are broader, more detailed and better organized than they are in earlier dictionaries of this kind. It is unclear whether Burn intended to publish this book; it was edited, expanded and published posthumously by his son, John Burn. * First edition. Burrill, a graduate of Columbia College who studied with James Kent, enjoyed a high reputation as a scholarly legal writer. The *Dictionary of American Biography* describes this dictionary as "a work of very high standard, which at once took its place as perhaps the best book of its kind so far produced. All his books were distinguished for their graceful style and a scholarly precision and finish which earned the unstinted commendation of the judiciary. 

* With tables and indexes. Attempts to codify the body of canon law began in earnest during the Carolingian period. These efforts reached fruition between 1020 and 1025 in the *Decretum* of Burchard, Bishop of Worms. This was superseded in 1151 by Gratian's epochal *Concordia Discordantium Canonum*, or *Decretum Gratiani*. Though never officially sanctioned, this

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work is the cornerstone of the body of texts known as the Corpus Juris Canonici. The next great step was taken in 1234 with the Liber Quinque Decretalium of Gregory IX, the first official collection of canon law. The Liber Sextus of Boniface VIII (1298) added updates and modifications. John XXII added the final official collection of canon law, the Liber Septimus Decretalium, better known as the "Constitutiones Clementis V" or simply "Clementinae" (1317). Two more texts were added later: the Extravagantes of John XXII (1325) and the Extravagantes Communes of other popes to 1484. The texts in this volume are drawn from the edition produced between 1580 and 1582 by the Correctores Romani, a commission established by the Council of Trent. (The title page notes the editorial approval of Gregory XIII, the pope who supervised the revisions.) The Corpus Juris Canonici remained in force until the promulgation of the Codex Juris Canonici in 1917. Our 1661 edition includes Giovanni Paoli Lancelotti's Institutionum Juris Canonici Commentarium (1563). 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

* First edition. Cumberland is one of the most important jurisprudential writers of the early modern period. 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

* Only edition. In a survey of seventeenth century English legal literature Holdsworth observes that the least satisfactory books are those dealing with legal theory. 

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

* Third and final edition. First published in 1727, this was the first textbook on equity published since St. Germain's *Doctor and Student* (1523). It is generally considered to be the book that founded the field of equity jurisprudence. Francis outlines fourteen maxims, such as "Equality is Equity" and "Equity suffers not a right to be without a remedy." Each maxim is followed by a brief summary of cases that illustrate its application. As Roscoe Pound observed, Francis created a precursor to the casebook: "his maxims for the most part are independent attempts to state principles derived from the study of cases" (Pound). 

* First edition. White pine timber was an ideal material for masts. In order to ensure a supply of this wood for the Royal Navy, Parliament passed the White Pine Act of 1711. Extending the scope of a 1691 act for Massachusetts, the act prohibited colonists from felling any white pine trees larger than 24 inches in diameter. It was one of the first Parliamentary acts to inspire colonial resistance. Although it remained in force until the Revolution, colonists subverted, resisted and evaded this law on a regular basis. Bibliographically distinct, this imprint is a one of the session laws issued under general title pages beginning *Anno Regni Annae Reginae Magnae Britanniae*, *Franciae*, & Hiberniae. 

* This court document records the initiation of the divorce proceedings of Thomas and Ann Hooton, a couple who lived in Bebington, Cheshire, a small town in the north of England about 5 miles from Liverpool. At this time divorces took place in the Ecclesiastical Courts. Its proceedings were conducted in Latin according to English Ecclesiastical Law. Little is known about these two, but records indicate that the Hootons were an old and prominent family in Cheshere. It was certainly a wealthy family. * Only edition. After abolishing slavery in 1807, Great Britain worked successfully to convince other slave-trading nations to follow its example. Sweden, a nation with a large and active trade in slaves, outlawed the practice in 1813. This 1825 treaty ratified a commitment by Sweden to use its navy to intercept slave traders, a practice initiated by the West Africa Squadron of Britain's Royal Navy in 1808. * Second edition. Sullivan was Royal Professor of the Common Law at the University of Dublin. One of the first attempts to sketch the outlines of English constitutional law, this book had its origins in a series of lectures. Holdsworth notes that the "needs of [Sullivan's] students had made it necessary for him to adopt a plan which was different from the plan adopted by Blackstone. Blackstone's students were more advanced; and, as Blackstone's lectures were given in a law vacation, they could supplement the information which he gave them by information acquired by means of attendance upon the courts of Westminster." As a result Sullivan is more elementary in its scope, but also more detailed because it explains several matters that are only implied or omitted altogether by Blackstone. This book is thus an excellent companion to Blackstone and a valuable primary source for the study of eighteenth-century English common law. 





Wood pays some attention as well to Roman law's influence on the historical development of English law.
