THIRD, FINAL AND BEST EDITION, the last one published under Adams's supervision. He wrote this fundamental contribution to American political theory when he was the American ambassador at the Court of St. James. First published in London, the *Defence* was a profound influence on the delegates to the Constitutional Convention of 1787 and the framers of several post-Revolutionary state constitutions. It also did much to familiarize Europeans with the novel political events taking place in America. Adams intended the Defence to be a one-volume work. He added two more volumes in 1787 and 1788 to offer more examples and address issues raised by critics. The first volume, reprinted from the London edition, was reprinted in New York and Philadelphia in 1787 and Boston in 1788. An abridged two-volume French translation was published in Paris in 1792. The third edition, a corrected reprint of the second and final London edition, 1794, was the only complete three-volume text published in the United States. Not in Sabin. Howes 60. Cohen 2736.



SECOND EDITION. An interesting pamphlet that disputes the reasons for revolution advanced by the Continental Congress. A fascinating document, it is practically a point-by-point rebuttal of the claims put forth in the Declaration of Independence, which the anonymous author may have read. Designated the second edition, this is one of seven issues, all with identical content and printed in 1776. Four were published in London, one in Nottingham, one in Dublin and one of Scotland, probably Edinburgh. All of these are rare, with few holdings in North America. OCLC locates 7 copies of all editions in North America, 2 of the second (at Columbia and the University of Michigan). 

FIRST AMERICAN EDITION of the Commentaries with the second issue of the Interesting Appendix. Blackstone's Commentaries, a synoptic review of the English legal system, is the most influential publication in the history of modern Anglo-American law. It was especially popular in America, where it was the standard introductory legal textbook into the late nineteenth century and was the primary, or only, book studied by hundreds of self-taught lawyers, such as Abraham Lincoln. The first multivolume book printed in America, Bell's edition, a reprint of the fourth London edition, 1770, is a landmark in the history of American publishing. Our set contains the two tipped-in advertisement leaves, for An Interesting Appendix (Volume III) and Ferguson's Essay on the History of Civil Society (Volume IV), that are often missing in copies of this set. Volume IV also includes a 22-page subscriber list that includes John Adams, John Jay, John Dickinson, several colonial governors and many leading merchants, judges and military officers of colonial America. An original work compiled by Bell, An Interesting Appendix is a group of essays on religious liberty inspired by a passage in the Commentaries, Book IV, Chapter 4, Section III, "Of Offences Against God and Religion." Intended to be the fifth volume of his Blackstone edition, it was first published in 1772. The English-style binding of our set is uncommonly ornate and accomplished for an eighteenth-century American book. We have never seen a copy of this title with such a handsome contemporary binding. The spine of An Interesting Appendix differs slightly from the uniform spines of Volumes I-IV, but was clearly designed to match them as closely as possible. Eller 80, 255. Laeuchli 131, 616.

 ${\tt SOLE\ EDITION.\ The\ American\ merchant\ marine\ thrived\ during}$ the early years of the Napoleonic wars. Remaining neutral and trading freely with Great Britain and France, who were occupied with warfare rather than commerce, American traders contributed greatly to the expansion of the U.S. economy. Beginning in 1805, however, France and Great Britain began to restrict and punish U.S. trade to their enemies. President Jefferson responded with Non-Intercourse and Embargo Acts (1807, 1809), which aimed for a restoration of free American trade through economic pressure. It had a devastating effect on the U.S. economy and was extremely unpopular in New England and the Mid-Atlantic states, which had benefited the most from the maritime economy. Tried in Salem, MA, United States v. Brigantine William was, in effect, a referendum on Jefferson's embargo. The decision, reported at 28 Federal Cases 615 (D.C., D. Mass. 1808), upheld the constitutionality of the embargo laws. Cohen 11226.

ONLY EDITION (in this form). Bollan was a lawyer and agent for the Colony of Massachusetts. *A Succinct View* is an extract from Bollan's *The Freedom of Speech and Writing upon Public Affairs Considered*, a longer work first published in 1766, that discusses the role of parliamentary supremacy. It is a subtle and somewhat subversive work. Bollan begins by asserting "that the 'care of common rights' should be left to Parliament. In the midst of what was essentially an apologia for parliamentary supremacy, Bollan thus implied, first, that some non-common rights existed, and second, that protecting such rights might be within the purview of an authority other than Parliament" (LaCroix). AS FAR AS WE CAN DETERMINE, this broadside printing of the act founding this northern Illinois town, home of Northern Illinois University, is unrecorded. This appears to be an unofficial printing. The anonymous printer ran out of space at the end of the fifth column of text. Omitting the penultimate Article 44, on filling the vacancy of the office of the constable, the printer assigned that number to the final pro-forma two-line article, "This act shall be deemed a public act... &c.," but then omitted the date, "Approved Feb. 21, 1861." No copies listed on OCLC or in the state-wide catalogue of the Illinois State Library.

THIS APPEARS TO BE A TRUE FIRST. Cohen lists this as an 1829 (c. 1828) imprint with the following pagination: viii, 212 pp. This copy has a title page dated 1828 and a different pagination. Shaw lists the 1829 imprint but omits the 1828. OCLC locates 4 copies dated 1828 with the pagination of the 1829 imprint, 2 identical to ours. See Cohen 4634. Shaw and Shoemaker 37952.

AN EVENT THAT ADVANCED A SUCCESSFUL MOVEMENT TO REDUCE THE NUMBER OF CAPITAL CRIMES IN MASSACHUSETTS

IN 1820 CLARK BURNED DOWN A BARN. There was no loss of life, but he was tried for a capital crime, found guilty and sentenced to death. The jury recommended commutation to no avail. He was sixteen years of age when he committed the crime, seventeen when executed. His case helped to advance a successful movement to reduce the number of capital crimes. By 1852 only murder remained as a capital offense. OCLC locates 4 copies (at Yale Law School, the New-York Historical Society, the Massachusetts Historical Society and the Vermont Historical Society). We located another copy at the American Antiquarian Society. Cohen lists this item but notes that he didn't handle a copy; his entry is based on a dealer's catalogue. Cohen also notes another broadside, again unseen, a 16-page pamphlet at Harvard Law School, and a 63-page report of the trial, at Yale Law School. Curiously, there is nothing for Clark in McDade, which is surprising given the contemporary and long-term importance of the case. These omissions in McDade suggest the rarity of these four accounts. ONLY EDITION, published the same year in London and New York. "[T]he author trusts he will not be thought presumptuous in stating, that a compendious digest, immediately calculated for the use of merchants and their agents, still remains a desideratum in the merchant's world. With a view to supply this deficiency, he commenced the following compilation": (vii). Burn was a barrister of the Inner Temple who published several law books. The appendix contains summaries of two recent English decisions, and the form of an insurance policy for a ship or goods. Cohen 7055.

ONLY EDITION, one of two issues (the other in Volume III of the American Law Journal). A translation of De Rebus Bellicus, part one of Bynkershoek's Quaestiones Juris Publici (1737), A Treatise on the Law of War addresses the customs of land and sea warfare. A notably humane work, it condemns actions against civilians and advocates the fair treatment of prisoners of war. Du Ponceau's able translation is prefaced by a biography of the author, a table of cases, an index of citations from the Corpus Juris Civilis and an annotated bibliography of civil law treatises cited or referred to by the author. This latter item, which lists editions and translations, is interesting for its insights into the American reception of the civil law in the early 1800s. One of the most important jurists and international lawyers of his time, Bynkershoek was an influential Dutch jurist who founded the positive school of international law, which held that usage and practice were more important than deductions drawn from natural law. Du Ponceau is an important figure in the early history of American law and letters. He founded the Law Academy of Philadelphia in 1821, was the President of the American Philosophical Society and was a much-consulted expert on international relations and linguistics. Cohen 7166.



IN THE CHOCTAW LANGUAGE. With an appendix of treaties. This work provides the Constitution and laws of the (sovereign) Chickasaw Nation, together with the treaties of 1832, 1833, 1834, 1837, 1852, 1855 and 1866. It also includes an act of Congress from January 1898 governing the tribal courts of the Indian Territory and the Curtis Act of June 28, 1898. A landmark in the history of Indian affairs, this act, also known as the General Allotment Act, completed the work of the earlier Dawes Act (1887), which dissolved the sovereignty of the tribes and gave U.S. citizenship to Native Americans. The Curtis Act abolished tribal governments on March 6, 1906 and weakened tribal structures through the conversion of tribal lands to individual plots. The act also provided for the assimilation of the young through the establishment of public schools. It was repealed in 1935. Taking advantage of this opportunity, the Chickasaw reorganized its tribal government in the 1960s and adopted a new constitution in 1983 to manage tribal businesses. Homer, or Homma, was a Choctaw lawyer and preacher. According to Hargrett, 500 copies of this book were printed. FOURTH EDITION, published the same year as the first three. "As soon as it appeared, Cushing's *Manual...*became a guide for the procedure of all organized assemblies. Its sale was extensive, and thousands of copies were abroad as well as in this country... It was so thorough and complete in its original form that it is in constant use today by legislative bodies. 

BLACK WAS A LAW PROFESSOR at the University of Kentucky and the author of Ill-Starred Prohibition Cases: A Study in Judicial Pathology (1931), which has a foreword by Darrow. Darrow's letter from February 26 was probably written in 1930 or 1931, the period in which the two exchanged a number of letters about the manuscript of Black's book. Darrow appears to be discussing a passage in the manuscript: "I am convinced that both propositions you are examining would stand the test of law, assuming they ever reached the courts. Of course you and I both know that it would be easier to win on them now than it would have been a few years ago. I can really imagine no argument against it. The only thing that could be said is that it is an effort to do something indirectly that can't be done directly, but that is not a valid objection. It seems to me that essentially every point has been pressed upon." The letter is accompanied by a first edition, first issue, of Darrow's autobiography. A TURNING POINT IN THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION

FEBRUARY 1776. New York City's strategic position linking New England to the other colonies is in peril. General George Washington's newly-formed Continental Army is fully engaged up north, besieging Boston. Dispatched from the siege by Washington, Major General Charles Lee arrives in New York City on February 4, 1776. The royal governor of New York, William Tryon, has fled the city with public records and sought refuge aboard a British naval vessel in New York harbor. New Yorkers, most of them Loyalists, look anxiously to the future. What will be the city's fate during this power vacuum? March, 1776. The British retreat from Boston in the third week. Rebellious New York colonists await the Empire's punitive wrath. The British will invade; New Yorkers can only wonder when. Secrecy is necessary. Passwords will be used. Also

known as the Battle of Brooklyn Heights, The Battle of Long Island would take place in August 1776. From February through April 1776 the orderly Book of Captain John Dorlon's Duchess County, New York "Minute Men" carefully documents the critical preparations to fortify and defend New York City and Long Island. Its tone grows progressively urgent as it becomes clear that the British are about to leave Boston.

Born in Hempstead, Long Island, Dorlon served as a company commander in Colonel Jacobus Swartwout's Second Regiment of Minute Men raised in Duchess County, New York. Dorlon's 43man company was based in Manhattan in a location near Trinity Church and Wall Street. His orderly book contains regimental orders for his company and general orders for all the troops in New York City. It shows the civilian populations of New York, both slave and free, were used to assist the troops build defensive earthworks ordered by General Lee. These were constructed at the lower end of Manhattan, at Horn's Hook near the entrance of Long Island Sound, and Brooklyn Heights, a strategic eminence overlooking New York City. The building of platforms and chevaux de frise and the preparatory work of carpenters, blacksmiths, cutlers, and "Armours" [armorers] is described in detail. The book includes orders relating to the maintenance of orderly books, fatigue and work details, artillery, courts-martial, drilling of troops and musicians, moving of prisoners, and mustering instructions for guard and patrol duties. These latter orders include important instructions to patrol for rioters at sutling and dram houses and repeated instructions to avoid antagonizing the civilian population, whose support they needed. Several entries refer to a "Laboratory," possibly referred to as such because its work involved gunpowder. A roster or "True Roll" of Captain Dorlon's company as of March 6, 1776 is included in the orderly book in a section where Dorlon kept account of military pay and expenses, July 25, 1776 December 25, 1776. In that section Dorlon also records the pay scale for all ranks within the Regiment, orders concerning rations of food and supplies and a note about arms and accouterments, such as "a



Good Gun & Bayonet," "Tomhawk" and "Colours" [flags] necessary for a "March or Campaign." Other preparatory orders concern the distribution of working tools and their repair, where the troops were to assemble during an alarm, mustering and drill orders for the drummers and fifers, and the sweeping of chimneys to prevent fires.

General Lee was in overall command when he began the orderly book, but within a few weeks Lee was ordered to the Carolinas. Defensive efforts carried on, but under a new commander and with an increasing sense of urgency. By April 5, 1776, orders were changed to begin enforcing the use of passwords at night for anyone, including civilians. These orders also showed the need for a higher level of security. Further seen is the recording of the daily order giving the secret "Parole" (word) and "Counter Sign" (password) to be used by officers, guards and pickets. Interestingly, the words chosen by the New York "Head Quarters" are mostly the names of American generals and politicians. For example: "Putnam," "Schuyler," "Wasington" and "Washinton" [Washington], "Mifflin," "Armstrong," "Gates," "Woodhull," "Handcock" [Hancock], "Franklin," "Carroll," "Dickison" [Dickinson], "Wilks" [for John Wilkes?], "Adams" and "Rush." Did the general command choose these names to instill a sense of national political unity and military duty and comradeship in the troops? Augmenting this sentiment, the orderly book uses American-made paper with the cautiously patriotic watermark, "Liberty & Prudence." At this juncture the colonies had not yet declared independence; New York was undecided about this matter. Indeed, many were Loyalists. Here, in John Dorlon's orderly book, in early 1776, we can see the Continental Army and its supporters as they steeled themselves to face the wrath of the British Empire.

Two later entries and a laid-in leaf of note offer a few facts about Dorlon's life after the Revolution. On the second leaf of the manuscript is the following, later inscription: "Benj[ami]n. B. Baker Augt. 29th 181[7?] This day Perused within [the orderly book] Southquay." An additional inscription on the verso of the first leaf,

signed "Benj[ami]n. B. B[piece missing]", notes that "Capt John Dorlon died at South-quay Nansemond Co[unty] [extinct] State of Virginia, the 22nd a[?] of May, (a little after Sunset), 182[4] he resided at this place fo[r] many years previous to his Death.he was borne in [the] year of 1751, August 13th." Also, there is laid into the orderly book a small, unsigned and undated one-page manuscript entitled "Memorandum for Colonel Copeland." This memorandum is a query concerning the possibility that late Captain Dorlon's descendants may be entitled to a pension for Dorlon's services during the American Revolution in Colonel Swartwout's New York Regiment. The handwriting of the memorandum does not appear to be that of Benjamin B. Baker (though it could be a copy), but its author declares that Captain Dorlon's "orderly book is in my possession." Benjamin Beverly Baker was the step-son of Captain Dorlon. Captain Dorlon settled in Virginia after the American Revolution and there married Judith Baker, the widow of Richard Baker and mother of three children. Benjamin B. Baker died unmarried and an older sister died young. The memorandum references "General Millson." this is likely a reference to Congressman John S. Millson of Virginia, chairman, Committee on Revolutionary Pensions in the Thirty-second Congress, 1851-1853. See Boddie, Southside Virginia Families. Fernow ed., Documents Relating to the Colonial History of the State of New York. Volume XV. State Archives, Vol. I. [New York in the Revolution]. Syrett, The Papers of Alexander Hamilton, Volume I, 1768-1778. Note: The watermark of the American-made paper used in the orderly book, "Liberty & Prudence" (Gravell & Miller 661) is documented among the papers of George Washington from 1777.

A LETTER TO CHARLES SUMNER ABOUT

AN INTERESTING LETTER FULL OF DISCUSSION, not of cases or points of law, but of various matters relating to American law publishing. Written to Charles Sumner, whose reputation as a statesman during the period of the Civil War and Reconstruction tends to obscure his early career as a distinguished lawyer, was a graduate of the Harvard Law School and a protege of Joseph Story. John Appleton graduated from Bowdoin College in 1822, moved to Bangor in 1832, and eventually rose to the top of his profession as a Maine jurist, becoming chief justice of the Supreme Judicial Court of that state in 1862. His two greatest achievements were the Maine Law Reports, "perhaps the most valuable single contribution to the legal literature of his state..." and his effort to abolish "the principle of common law that a party might not be a witness in his own behalf in either civil or criminal cases. In [this]... Appleton was a confirmed disciple of Bentham... In 1856 he had the satisfaction of seeing the Maine legislature enact a law that no person should be "excused or excluded as a witness in any civil suit or proceeding at law or in equity, by reason of his interest in the event' ... Eight years later this principle was extended to criminal cases" (DAB). That topic is brought up presciently on the third page of this letter. "I think there will be a move in our legislature this winter to introduce parties as witnesses but with little success as yet. It is a long time before truth can be expected to prevail, but the beginning is so [on] & a change once made in one state will most assuredly make way for change in all."

The letter opens with reference to Sumner's American Jurist and Law Magazine. Appleton requests offprints of two articles he has contributed and mentions two more he is working on, "Husband and Wife" and "The Law of Attorney and Client in relation to their testifying." He urges Sumner to make a greater effort to obtain subscribers. Appleton has enlisted 20 in Maine. "It is taken much in the West & in Penn & N York. I should imagine some little personal exertion of some friends would place its prosperity on a solid basis. "He goes on to discuss reports to which he is subscribing, disappointed by the condensed Exchequer Reports by Troubat. "He is not enough of a condenser. There is so much of English practice, which is not of the slightest use to us here." He makes the same criticism of Sergeant's condensed reports. Hall's Reports of the Superior Court of New York City he likes "very much. The decisions of that court I should think [are] entitled to as much weight as those of the State court." He anticipates publication of Story's work on equity, "as I intend looking into equity more, as the increased powers of our court will create much of that business (as will) the host of land trades the past season..." He is about to revise his old articles on evidence for Mr. Purdon "with occasional notes and for that purpose I shall want one or two numbers of the Jurist to make out the whole set. I shall have them published as they were in the Jurist...intending, if ever I should publish the whole, to revise & rewrite, as may then seem meet." In fact his collected articles did appear in 1860 under the title The Rules of Evidence. He closes with a nod to Maine winters, "enough to frighten anyone but a native born down Easter. I have almost been tempted to leave the frigid regions of the North for the warm and sunny climes of the South." DAB 1:329.

LIVINGSTON WAS AN ATTORNEY AND JUDGE in Lancaster County, Pennsylvania. He read law from 1845 to 1848 with Thaddeus Stevens [1792-1868], who, as a member of the U.S. House of Representatives, went onto become leaders of the anti-slavery Radical Republicans during the Civil War and Reconstruction. In 1862 Livingston became the county's district attorney. In 1871 he was elected president judge of the second judicial district of Pennsylvania, a post he held until 1904. His docket book, which lists memoranda of cases, lists of services rendered and fees charged over an 11-year period, offers a fine perspective on the professional activity of a well-respected attorney with a thriving practice. 

Mauduit, or Maudit, was a British merchant, writer and colonial agent for Massachusetts. *Considerations* urges the British public to support measures to suppress the American Revolution. He dismisses concerns about the economic consequences of military force and trade disruption, describes the value of retaining the colonies and stresses how the English constitution would be undermined if the colonists were granted independence. Since most colonists are loyal subjects held captive by a band of "tyrants," the Continental Congress, he observes, the Crown is obligated to defend their freedom. Maudit changed his mind after three years of warfare. In 1779 he became an advocate for American independence. OCLC locates 12 copies in North America, none in law libraries. 



Bradford. Subscribers' names were first solicited in February, 1755, the compilers having spent nearly two years in its preparation. Three more years were consumed in printing, and it was not until May, 1758, that it was ready for delivery. Up to that time 170 copies had been subscribed for, and the editors say, in the Pennsylvania Journal, May 11. 1758, 'a number of copies yet remain not subscribed for,' and 'any person may be supplied' until 'the 17th of July next, after which we will not further extend the sale'": *Tower* 165. 

A BRIEF BUT INTRIGUING LETTER, in which Story orders two books on art, apparently for his son, William Wetmore Story [1819–1895], who would graduate from the Harvard Law School later this year. (The books are: Flaxman's Lectures on Sculpture, "with first impressions of the plates" and Bloomfield's Recensio Synoptica.) Was this meant to be a graduation present? Whether it was or not, Joseph Story knew William had an interest in art and, like any good father, nurtured his son's passions. (He couldn't imagine his son would later abandon a distinguished legal career to become a sculptor.) Upon graduation, William entered the law firm of Hilliard and Sumner and published two law treatises by 1847. Sculpture remained an avid hobby at this time; by 1846 Harvard had a bust of his father that he made. Ironically, it was his

father's death in 1845 that led him to abandon law and become a professional sculptor. The trustees of Mt. Auburn cemetery elected him to sculpt a likeness of his father for the cemetery's memorial chapel. "To prepare himself to carry out this commission he went to Italy in 1847 and from that time forth became more and more eager to give up the law entirely in favor of sculpture." (Gardner). Perhaps his best-known work is the iconic statue of Joseph Story that graces the entrance to Langdell Hall at Harvard Law School. The fact that this was sent under Daniel Webster's free frank is odd. Presumably Story had his own franking privilege. Perhaps he left Washington in a hurry, giving Webster his letters to mail. 





ONLY EDITION. This account emphasizes the evils of liquor. "Walmsley was the son of a half-blood Indian of the Narragansett tribe and had the Indians' weakness for liquor. He also felt 'shut out by my complexion and the ignominy which the world has cast upon the tribe I belong.' After a drinking bout at his house, he and his brother followed Burke and his mulatto [i.e. Native American] woman into the woods where they beat them and left them senseless. Two weeks later their bodies were found; they apparently died of the attack" (McDade). Hannah Frank, apparently a Nipmuc Indian, was a beautiful 19-year old woman who worked as a housekeeper for the Walmsley brothers. John Burke was a peddler who came to town recently to sell his wares. They fell in love and decided to marry, which angered the brothers. Their mood enhanced by liquor, they followed the couple and beat them to death. (Some accounts say that one of the victims was decapitated, but none say whether it was Frank or Burke.) A SENSATIONAL CASE that captured the attention of the public. James Gordon Bennett's Herald took the lead in publishing the complete romantic correspondence between George Barnard and Mary Power, the daughter of a prosperous steamboat captain. Barnard forsook mercantile wealth for a career as an itinerant ornamental painter. By 1833, having met with nothing but geographical and emotional distance and verbal abuse as she attempted to get Bernard to commit to marriage, Mary married John Gaul. Barnard sued for breach of promise, seeking \$10,000 in damages. The jury awarded him \$1000, which outraged Bennett. In the Herald he railed against Barnard and the noxious precedent set by the award which he saw as emblematic of the victimization of women disadvantaged by the new social order. The presiding judge was Ogden Edwards, grandson of Jonathan Edwards and nephew of Aaron Burr. Edwards made no secret of his disgust with Barnard's perverse attempt to exploit an injury of his own doing, despite the jury's decision. Shaw and Shoemaker 30299. Cohen 11415.





Born in Spain, Abendana, a member of the Sephardic community, was hakam (local rabbi) of the Spanish Portuguese Synagogue in London. He also pursued an academic career. He taught Hebrew at Cambridge University and went on to join the faculty of Magdalen College, Oxford. A prolific writer, he was England's authority on Jewish religion, culture and law. This reputation was due in part to his annual Oxford Almanack. In addition to the expected almanac topics, each issue contained information about Jewish customs, laws and other matters. The Discourses collect the Jewish-related material from his almanacs. 



FIRST EDITION. Texts of documents in Latin, Blackstone's essay in English. The engraved dedication to the Earl of Westmoreland is surmounted with his armorial ensigns; initials in the text are ornamented with engravings of various buildings at Oxford University. The tail pieces on pages Ixxvi and 73 are historical vignettes; the other ten tail-pieces are facsimiles of the royal seals attached to the original documents. This remarkable work is esteemed for its production and scholarship. Its physical appeal was recognized as early as 1829 in Richard Thompson's An Historical Essay on the Magna Charta of King John, which described it as a "beautiful and rare edition." Blackstone's essay, which is based on a great deal of original research, supported Coke's belief that the charter was the foundation of English liberties. More important, Blackstone's research into the original texts demonstrated that all earlier editions of the charter were based on the significantly different reissue of 1225, in the reign of Henry III, rather than the original one endorsed at Runnymede. His philological approach was highly influential; it established the textual focus that has governed subsequent study of the charter. Eller notes that Worrall's Bibliotheca Legum Angliae (1788) lists an edition from 1758 with the title Magna Charta and Charta de Foresta. She was not able to locate any copies, however. 



The preface in vol. 1... includes an account of the life of Blackstone, which was reprinted verbatim or with slight changes, in many editions of the Commentaries after the author's death. 



(They became obsolete when George II ordered the exclusive use of English in 1733.) This elimination cleared space for other material and longer entries. Indeed, Burn's articles on such subjects as judgment, jury, purchase and will are broader, more detailed and better organized than they are in earlier dictionaries of this kind. It is unclear whether Burn intended to publish this book; it was edited, expanded and published posthumously by his son, John Burn. This copy was owned by four prominent attorneys from counties near Harrisburg, Pennsylvania's capital. Patterson, lived in Dauphin County. published in America in 1721, it had a profound influence on several colonial readers, including the founding fathers. It was the primary source for William Penn's *Excellent Priviledge of Liberty and Property* (1687), a work that inspired support for the revolution. George Mason used it when drafting Virginia's Declaration of Rights (1776). Jefferson, who owned this edition and the first edition, probably referred to it when he wrote the Declaration of Independence and the Virginia Statute for Religious Freedom. The fellows acquiesced, but this was not enough for the king, who ordered them to admit their wrongdoing and ask for his pardon. Most of the fellows refused and were ejected and replaced by Catholics. Care supported the King's actions. Though not uncommon, few copies of this title are held in North American law libraries. 

ONLY EDITION, ONE OF 6 ISSUES FROM 1800. The first regular police force in England, Thames River Police was established to prevent the theft of maritime cargo in London and on the River Thames. It was founded, with advice from Jeremy

Bentham, by John Harriot, a justice of the peace, mariner and inventor, and Patrick Colquhoun, the magistrate, social reformer and advocate of police forces. The river police proved to be a valuable crime deterrent. Originally financed by a group of merchants, it was transformed a year later into a permanent public agency. This book is a history of the force and a description of its organization and duties. A widely circulated book, it inspired the establishment of similar forces in New York, Dublin, Sydney and many other cities. 





First published in 1666, it is a rich mine of information concerning the sources of English law and the history of the early English legal profession, and provides a wealth of interesting information about the procedures, customs, ceremonies and administration of the Inns of Court and Chancery. "[This] book was the chief authority for the history of the Inns; and it is by no means superseded even at the present day." (Holdsworth). Cooke's updated version was reissued in 1739 and c. 1740. 

A lawyer by training, Dugdale was one of the great antiquarians of the seventeenth century and the author of such important works as Origines Juridicales, The Antiquities of Warwickshire and the present work, which is devoted to ecclesiastical institutions. Written with Roger Dodsworth, the first edition, in three-volumes, was published from 1655-1673. Our lavish 1849 edition, a reissue of Bohn's 1846 edition, the first with original and re-drawn images by Coney, features portraits, facsimiles of documents, views of buildings, floor plans, maps, coats of arms and trees of descent. Though not primarily a legal work, it has a great deal of legal information. As noted in the preface, "the work from Leiger Books, Chartularies, Rolls, and other National Documents [renders this work] indispensible to those professional men, who, on questions respecting Real Property, practice in the highest courts of the country, the Privy Council, and the Court of Chancery. Hence it will be seen that, acknowledged and admitted as it is, as evidence in all doubtful points as to the distribution of property, and in tracing landed possessions from their earliest proprietors, the Monasticon is indispensible to every Lawyer employed in the higher walks of his profession (i). This copy is missing one of its original plates. However this loss is compensated by the addition of more than 100 leaves filled with copperplates, lithographs and woodcuts from a variety of sources. 

SECOND EDITIONS. An appealing volume with a choice dual Anglo-American provenance. John Hanson Thomas [1779-1815], eminent Maryland lawyer, acquired this volume two months before this death in 1815, the year in which he was selected by his

party for a seat in the United States Senate. The volume originally belonged to the British aristocrat, Legh Master of Newhall [1717-1796], who came to Maryland in 1773 (other sources say ca. 1765) and established a plantation and pig-iron blast furnace on his estate in Frederick County. The estate was confiscated in 1775 when he was suspected of being a Loyalist. It was later restored to him. He committed a gruesome double murder after the war. "[He] was said to have sexually harassed a Negro slave girl. He became angry when another slave called Sam attempted to help her. He threw Sam into the furnace alive, then killed the girl and disposed of the body by bricking it up in an oven. During renovations of Avandale house in the 1930s, the oven was opened and a human skeleton was found inside.": Codner & District Local History and Heritage Website, The Master Family (available online). 

It also provides a good deal of information about fishing, navigation, agriculture and commercial activities along the river. A second edition was published in 1758. Both are very scarce. 

First published in Paris in 1625, The Rights of War and Peace established the system of modern public international law, based on the concept of "droit naturel," a morality-based law that superseded the personalities of individuals or nations. Grotius describes the situations in which war is a valid tool of law enforcement and outlines the principles of armed combat. Though based on Christian natural law, Grotius advanced the novel argument that his system would still be valid if it lacked a divine basis. In this regard he pointed to the future by moving international law in a secular direction. First published in 1715 (with Barbeyrac's notes), Morrice's edition and translation was produced with the assistance of Edward Littlehales (1690-1724) and John Spavan (1685-1718). Lowndes III:950. CROMWELL REFUSED TO GRANT A PARDON

ONLY EDITION. Hall was a poet employed as a pamphleteer by Cromwell. He was, in other words, a propagandist for the Commonwealth. A Gagg to Love's Advocate defends the recent execution of Christopher Love [1618–1651], a controversial Welsh Protestant preacher and advocate of Presbyterianism. He was convicted of treason when the Commonwealth learned that he was communicating with the exiled Stuart court with the goal of restoring the Stuart monarchy. He went to his death as a martyr of the Presbyterians, who petitioned in vain to secure his pardon. Cromwell denied these petitions because we wished to suppress dissent among the Presbyterians. OCLC locates 6 copies in North America, none in law libraries. A few sources, most notably Wing's Short-Title Catalogue, suggest an attribution to John Hinde. The ESTC does not offer an attribution, though most scholarship indicates that Hall was the author. ESTC R206702.

SECOND AND FINAL EDITION of a work first published in 1698. Commons is open and uncultivated land or water owned by a lord to which certain occupiers of adjacent enclosed land have certain rights. These include the right to pasture animals, to fish (peschary), to cut peat (turbary) and to gather wood (estovers). A body of custom and enacted law with origins in the Anglo-Saxon period, commons was long considered a central English right and a cornerstone of the feudal structure. Indeed, the gradual elimination of commons through the series of enclosure acts enacted from 1760 to 1830 triggered widespread social protest. Though the acts were motivated by the needs of modern agriculture, and had a profound effect on the livelihood of small farmers and the poor, they were not attacked on economic grounds, but as violations of the ancient English rights described in the Law of Common. 



SEVENTH EDITION. Active in the Protectorate, where he was Cromwell's legal advisor, Sheppard aimed to reform the common law. Ahead of his time in many ways, some of his proposals anticipate changes to the common law that were adopted in the nineteenth century. In his discussion of the common law in the sixteenth century Holdsworth observes "[t]here was still a considerable amount of works to be done by [the courts leet and baron]. 

Matthews shows, "Sheppard recognized, however regretfully, that the restoration of the Stuart monarchy was the final act in the disruptive political drama of his generation and his shrewd analysis of how the law was being applied by the triumphal forces of Anglicanism was a forceful denunciation of the political abuses and technical shortcomings in the operation of contemporary law." SECOND AND FINAL EDITION. Gavelkind is a form of land tenure unique to Kent (and its environs) in which land descends equally to the decedent's sons. It was common during the Saxon era, but was gradually supplanted by primogeniture after 1066. Produced during the first wave of modern English legal scholarship, Somner's pioneering work was the first study of gavelkind, and one of the first important studies of early English law. Philological in orientation, it is a history of gavelkind and an analysis of its forms. Texts of significant documents are included. He also goes beyond his subject in one section to discuss the law of succession to chattels. Somner, a pupil of Causubon, was an ecclesiastical lawyer and historian of Anglo-Saxon law and literature who is best known for his pioneering *Dictionarium Saxonico-Latino-Anglicum* (1659). He touches on the still-controversial West Lothian question, which concerned the right of Scottish, Welsh or Irish MPs in the House of Commons to vote on issues specific to England. There is also an interesting chapter on Members' expenses. The first edition was published in 1710. Both editions are scarce. 

ONLY EDITION. This essay on religious freedom by the great Scottish lawyer, reforming Lord Advocate of Scotland and political opponent of the Stuarts had its basis in a pamphlet war. In 1667 Stewart contributed legal remarks to Naphtali: Or, The Wrestling of the Church of Scotland for the Kingdom of Christ, a pamphlet by James Stirling, a Covenanter minister, that defended the actions of Presbyterians against the imposition of episcopalianism by the British government, including the bloody Pentland Rising of 1666. It was attacked that year by Andrew Honeyman [1619–1676], Bishop of Orkney, in a Survey of the Insolent and Infamous Libel Entitled "Naphtali." Stewart replied with Jus Populi Vindicatum, a restatement of Naphthali's argument with more legal and political reinforcement. The Bishop did not publish a response. POSSIBLY INTENDED as the basis for a lithograph, this cartoon depicts a drunken Lord Sugden, wig askew and clutching a table for balance. He is addressing the Bench: "My Lord, (hiccup) this Sir Edward Bug--no, damn it, I Mean Sir Edward Sug-hiccup) den-this Bug- Sug-Bug! My Lord, I beg pardon, I'm rather & & &." There is a quote from Shakespeare below the image: "It fitteth not a Noble thus to plead!" Sugden, lawyer, judge and conservative politician, was Solicitor General of Great Britain in 1829-30, Lord Chancellor of Ireland in 1835, then from 1841 to 1846, and Lord Chancellor of Great Britain in 1852. He is wearing barrister's robes in this caricature, which indicates the period in his career between 1831 and 1835, when he practiced as a barrister and sat in the House of Commons. The caricature appears to be a commentary on his role as a leading opponent of the Reform Bill of 1832, which made him a prominent figure in British politics. The artist refers to Sugden as Chancellor, which leads us to date the image to 1835, the year of his Irish Chancellorship and a time when he was famous for his opposition to the Reform Bill.





There are frequent references to America, and considerable discussion of international law, the laws of war and the work of such important economists and theorists as Cantillon, Child, Cary, Postlethwayt, De Moivre and Price. A second, and final, London edition was published in 1783. Dublin reprints were issued in 1783 and 1794, a German translation in 1782–1787. The critical 80-page essay was also published separately in 1789. All of these are scarce. Concerning the 1783 Dublin edition, OCLC locates 10 copies in North American law libraries. 

A professor of Arabic at Cambridge University and librarian to the Archbishop of Canterbury, Wilkins was the most distinguished member of this trio. Leges Anglo-Saxonicae, which incorporates Spelman's Codex Legum Veterum, includes the collections of Anglo-Saxon customs that were made after the Conquest: the laws of Edward the Confessor, the laws of William I and the Leges Henrici Primi. Its circulation was widest in Italy, especially among the Venetians, but it was also influential in Western Europe. In addition to maritime law, it contains a great deal of information about the day-to-day operations of a ship and practical advice on seafaring. Commissioned by the Emperor Justinian in 530 CE, the body of writings known collectively as the Corpus Juris Civilis preserved and restated all existing Roman law. Compiled in three years under the direction of Tribonium, it was both a critical restatement of earlier law and jurisprudential writings and a complete collection of recent legislation. It is divided into four books, the Institutes, Digest, Code and Novels. The Code contains the laws in force during Justinian's reign. It is divided into 12 books. Book 1 deals with ecclesiastical law, the sources of law, and the duties of high officials. Books 2-8 deal with private law. Book 9 deals with criminal law. Books 10-12 deal with administrative law. It received a great deal of commentary during the medieval and

early modern eras. Denis Godefroy was influential well into the twentieth century. Godefroy was a jurist, humanist, historian, scholar of Roman law and professor at the Universities of Geneva and Heidelberg. WITH INDEX. Commissioned by the Emperor Justinian in 530 CE, the body of writings known collectively as the Corpus Juris Civilis preserved and restated all existing Roman law. It has four books: the Code, Novels, Institutes and Digest. Intended for students, the Institutes is a synopsis of the reformed legal system. It supplanted the earlier Institutes of Gaius. Stryk was a distinguished German jurist who was instrumental in developing German law from native sources rather than from received Roman law. He was an eminent professor of law at Halle whose pupils included Thomasius, Boehmer, Heineccius and Ludovici. His annotated edition of the Institutes was first published in 1698 and went through five editions, the last in 1726. The annotations, all of them footnotes, are extensive. AN EDITION of the *Institutes* Cujas with extensive commentary and notes by Jean Lacoste, Theodore Marcile and Marc-Antoine Muret. These jurists, who followed Cujas' example, were leaders of the French humanistic school, which aimed to purge Roman sources of later corruptions. Their pioneering methods did much to establish the field of philology. The *Institutes* is an elementary treatise on Roman private law that served as a standard text for 300 years. After its rediscovery during the medieval era it became a staple of European legal education. Not in the *BMC*.

THIS EDITION of the collected legal and theological writings of Pope Leo I was first published in 1561. Known as "the Great," Leo reigned from CE 440–461 and guided the development of the Church during the final decades of the Western Roman Empire. In power during its most turbulent period, he preserved the church through a vigorous reform of church discipline and persecution of heretics. The collation of this copy is identical with others dated 1569. The listing in *VD16* even gives the date of this imprint as "1568/1569," which suggests that it was issued twice with different dates. He is best known for his writings on international law and the legal history of Sweden. First published in 1651, with the second edition in 1665, this was one of the earliest Swedish law dictionaries. It contains brief entries of current and obsolete terms. It was a standard work for many years, and it is a useful resource today. KVK locates 10 copies of this edition, all in Europe. As centers of theology, law and the civil service, they had been coping with the effects of the Reformation and Counter-Reformation for nearly two decades. 

It went through four more editions in the eighteenth century, the last in 1794, and was reissued a few more times in the nineteenth and twentieth centuries. FIFTH EDITION, the last in the author's lifetime. Nevizzano was a professor of law at the University of Turin and the author of several legal studies. His Sylva Nuptialis (1521) is a wideranging miscellany derived from Roman and Canon law that addresses judicial problems connected with virginity, marriage, sexual matters, domestic manners, morals and estates. His view of women in this work is notably satirical and sarcastic, which probably enhanced its popularity. In his opinion, women were enthusiastic and effective torturers of men. They were successful, he reasoned, because their bodies were created by Satan and inhabited by the souls of fallen angels. The author's misogyny, along with his relaxed views about fornication and concubinage, which he did not consider mortal sins, attracted the Church's attention. He was commanded to remove some of the more objectionable passages in subsequent editions, which he did. He did not go far enough, however; the book was added to the Papal Index in 1596. 





His many works in numerous posthumous editions were accepted as authority through the end of the nineteenth century. The 1808 and 1826 editions were followed by editions in 1836, 1839, 1868, 1884. 


ONLY EDITION IN LATIN, with significant additions. The Roman maritime law of average, which requires all parties involved in a shipping enterprise to share the cost of sacrificing some goods in order to save others, is a principle that still applies in most countries. This classic treatise was written in the sixteenth century, but first published in 1617 in Dutch. It went through eleven more Dutch-language editions, the final in 1736. A French-language edition was published in 1703. The Latin edition incorporates the notes and observations of Simon van Leeuwen, which were added to later Dutch editions, and additional commentary by Matthaeus de Vicq. The notes are identified and arranged in double columns. Educated at the University of Louvain, Weytsen was a King's Counselor at the Hague during the mid-sixteenth century. ONLY EDITIONS LOCATED. The first item is the penal code for Corrientes, one of the provinces of Argentina. The second title, which is not legal in nature, is an essay defending the establishment of Buenos Aires as the national capital in 1880. Illustrated with plates depicting classrooms and school furniture, the final title is a book of regulations governing the construction of schools and the furnishing of classrooms. Mostly the work of Funes, its first constitution was issued in 1819. It was rejected by most of the rural provinces because it established a strong central government. This led to a civil war that was settled by rescinding this constitution. Some issues have an additional four-page manifesto indicting Spanish cruelty. In turn, Coahuila became a member of the short lived Republic of the Rio Grande in 1840. On February 19, 1856, Santiago Vidaurri annexed Coahuila to his state, Nuevo Leon, but it regained its separate status in 1868. ONLY EDITIONS. St. Christopher (St. Kitts) was discovered by Columbus in 1493. It was colonized by the British in 1623 and was the first British colony in the Leeward Islands. It was held jointly by the French and English from 1628 to 1713 and returned

to exclusive British rule under the terms of the Treaty of Utrecht in 1713. Often bound together, these two volumes are the first published compilations of the laws of St. Kitts. Pp. 165–182 of the 1739 Acts of Assembly contain acts from 1739–1740. The third title is the first printed edition of acts of the government of the Leeward Islands (Antigua, Barbuda, St. Kitts, Nevis and Anguilla). 

FINAL EDITION. First published in 1629, with a second volume in 1639, this important analysis of Spanish colonial law was written by a Spanish jurist who served as a judge of the high court at Lima. Married to the Creole daughter of the governor of Cuzco and resident in Peru for eighteen years, he acquired an unparalleled knowledge of the law and history of the Indies. According to Gongora, his treatise is the "most systematic juridical formulation of the problems of legitimisation of dominion in the seventeenth century [and] enjoyed an unrivalled prestige in the official and legal circles of the Indies for a century and a half."
