



Attractive woodcut printer devices, colophons and decorated initials. Toning and light browning in places, early owner initials to title page of first title, interior otherwise clean. \$2,000.

* Fourth, second and third editions, respectively. The first title is a commentary on the *Digest*, Book XII, Title 1: "Things Credited Giving Rise to Fixed Claims and the Condictio." *Parergon* is a collection of "thought pieces" on miscellaneous topics in Roman law. The final volume is a collection of consilia on matters relating to dueling. It is derived from his *Responsa*, a multi-part collection of consilia on different topics. All editions of these titles are scarce. *Digestorum*: OCLC locates 3 copies; *Parerga*: OCLC locates 6 copies. Both of these imprints not listed in Adams, Roberts or the *British Museum Catalogue*; *Singulari*: OCLC locates 3 copies of this edition.

Contemporary calf with later varnishing, blind rules and small central arabesques to boards, raised bands and later lettering piece to spine, spine ends and corners mended. Some scuffing to boards, corners bumped, front joint partially cracked, front hinge just starting, rear hinge mended, later armorial bookplate to front pastedown. Light toning to text, a bit of soiling to title page. Early owner annotations to front pastedown, signatures and stamps to title page, interior otherwise clean. Ex-library. Bookplate to front pastedown. A nice copy of a rare title. \$750.

* Only edition. Asinio was a notable Florentine jurist who was patronized by Cosimo I de Medici. He is best known for his treatises on practice and procedure in Roman and Florentine law. *De Executionibus* is a comprehensive treatise on the section of the *Digest*, Book XI, Title 7, which addresses funeral rites and burial. It is a scarce title. OCLC locates 5 copies, 3 in North America (Library of Congress, Newberry Library and University of Chicago).



Some soiling, especially to spine, minor wear to corners, some worming to pastedowns and endleaves, a few partial cracks to text block, boards slightly bowed. Some toning to text, light foxing in places. Early annotations and signatures to preliminaries and title page, other annotations and underlining to a few places in text, two inkstains to fol. 224 with minor damage to legibility. \$1,000.

* Later edition of a work first published in 1511. *Tractatus Foecundus* is concerned with the Roman law of prescription, the principle whereby a right or liability is created or extinguished over a certain period of time, usually in regard to a property title. It also includes an edition of a short treatise on this subject by Henricus de Segusio. It was a popular work that went through several issues and editions, the last one in 1582. Our 1564 copy was also issued in 1563. Both are identical in every respect and share the same entry number in *EDIT16*. All editions are scarce in North America. OCLC locates 2 copies of the 1564 edition in North America (at Harvard Law School and the Library of Congress).

An Important Study of Inheritance and Succession in Roman Law

Original marbled publisher boards, paper title label to spine. Moderate rubbing to extremities, heavy rubbing to spine, front joint starting, lower half of rear joint cracked through hinge, early bookseller stamp to front pastedown. Light toning to text, early annotations to rear pastedown. A nice copy. \$650.

* Only edition. A notable work of Historical School jurisprudence, this treatise addresses the Roman law of inheritance and succession and wills with comparisons to these laws in Prussia and, to a lesser extent, other German states. Bluntschli was one of the great Continental jurists of the nineteenth century. He published a code for the Canton of Zurich and works on German private law, the law of war and international law. His most important historical work is the *Geschichte des Allgemeinen Staatsrechts und der Politik* (1864). OCLC locates 1 copy (in Denmark) and 2 copies of a 1970 reprint, 1 in North America (UC-Berkeley Law School).

Light rubbing and some wormholes to contemporary sections, front hinge cracked. Title page, with woodcut architectural border by Graf, printed in red and black. Light to moderate toning, minor worming in places with no loss to legibility, light soiling to title page, faint dampstaining to margins and some edgewear to title page and following six leaves, dampstaining and a few chips to edges of final two leaves. \$4,000.

* Remembered today as the author of the moral and satirical Narrenschiff (The Ship of Fools), Brant was also a highly regarded law professor and state official. First published in 1490, and Brant's only original legal work, Expositiones was a popular, highly regarded introduction to the Corpus Juris Canonici and Corpus Juris Civilis. According to Stintzing-Landsberg, it is a useful guide to contemporary legal pedagogy in the Holy Roman Empire. Our edition also includes an equally renowned introductory textbook that Brant held in high regard: Caccialupi's Tractatus de Modo Studendi in Utroque Iure, which offers a basic history and outline of Europe's legal systems and advice on study methods. OCLC locates 6 copies, none in North America.



Light toning to text, early owner signature and small later inkstamp to margins of title page, interior otherwise clean. \$850.

* First German edition, published the same year as the first Venice edition. Carocci discusses the Roman law dealing with priorities of claims and liens. According to the title, this edition corrects numerous inaccuracies of the Venice edition. It was published at the expense of Peter Kopff, a notary in Frankfurt. A second edition was published in Venice in 1603. All are scarce. OCLC locates 3 copies of the 1597 imprints in North American law libraries, 2 of the Venice (UC-Berkeley, University of Michigan), 1 of the Frankfurt (Harvard).

Title page with large device printed in red and black, woodcut head-pieces, tail-pieces and decorated initials. Toning in a few places, rest of interior notably fresh. Early owner signature in fine hand to title page. A nice copy of a scarce title. \$350.

* Later edition. First published in 1609, this treatise on the Roman law on the right to use the property of another (usufruct) went through several editions and issues in Italy, Spain, France and Germany. According to the title page, this Venetian imprint has unique additions. Complete in itself, this became the first part of a two-volume set when an additional volume was published by Turrinum in 1646. Castillo Sotomayor was a distinguished Spanish canonist. Not in the *British Museum Catalogue*.





The Last Incunable Imprint of Cipolla's "Legal Cautions" Concerning Servitudes and Real Property

Contemporary quarter pigskin with elaborate blind tooling over oak wood boards, clasp (at center of boards) lacking, buckle present, early hand-lettered author name and "X" to spine. Binding slightly cocked, soiling to spine, some wear to corners, second work removed from rear of text block, early owner signature of Philipp von Flersheim to front pastedown, later library stamp of Heidelberg Capuchin Library to front free endpaper, early manuscript index and a few other annotations to rear pastedown. 44-line text in single column, comprising 325 numbered sections, text begins with 12-line multi-color illuminated initial depicting a scribe. Moderate toning, slightly heavier in places, brief early annotations in a few places, faint dampstaining to margins of a few leaves, light soiling to title page. \$15,000.

* Third edition, and the last incunable edition. Cipolla was a professor of law at the University of Padua, Venetian diplomat and one of the greatest Italian jurists of the fifteenth century. His works are notable for their humanistic scholarship and coordination of theoretical and practical concerns. *Cautelae Iuris* is a set of 325 knotty legal points, i.e. "legal cautions," concerning servitudes and real property under Roman and canon law. It was first printed in Perugia by Petrus Petri de Colonia and Johannes Nicolai de Bamberga around 1474 and reached its tenth edition in 1577. Philipp von Flersheim [1481-1522] was the bishop of Speyer. OCLC locates 5 copies of this imprint in North America, 1 in a law library (Library of Congress).

Title page, with woodcut vignette and architectural border, printed in red and black, small woodcut vignette at head of main text, woodcut decorated initials. Moderate toning to text, occasional faint dampstaining to margins, some edgewear and a few minor tears to title page and the following four leaves. Finger smudges, annotations to rear endleaves, underlining and brief annotations in few places, interior otherwise clean. \$1,500.

* Third edition. Cipolla was a professor of law at the University of Padua, Venetian diplomat and one of the greatest Italian Jurists of the fifteenth century. His works are notable for their humanistic scholarship and coordination of theoretical and practical concerns. *Tractatus Memoriaque* is a collection of seven essays on servitudes, real property and related topics in Roman and canon law. It is a collection based on titles that circulated in manuscript and the early printed era. The first edition in its final, seven-essay form appeared in 1511. It was issued several times into the sixteenth century. All editions are scarce. OCLC locates no copies of the 1525 imprint in North America. This edition not in Adams.

Occasional early annotations and underlining. Toning, dampstaining in a few places, interior otherwise clean. \$500.

* Second edition. With indexes. First published in 1565, this popular work on wills, gifts, feudal writs, usury and other topics in Roman criminal and civil law went through numerous editions throughout Europe well into the eighteenth century. These four tracts were books 3-4 of the author's unfinished *Sententiae Receptae*. Claro was a Milanese jurist. OCLC and KVK locate one copy of this edition in North America (at the Library of Congress). Another copy located at Harvard Law School. This edition not in Adams.

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



Moderate soiling, some rubbing to extremities, spine ends bumped with minor chipping, some chipping to board edges, corners bumped and somewhat worn, front free endpaper edgeworn and partially detached, bottom edge removed below image. Moderate toning to text, somewhat heavier in places, occasional faint dampstaining, minor worming in a few places (with no loss to text). Early signatures and annotations to front free endpaper and title page of *Commentarii ad Titulum Digestorum*, interior otherwise clean. \$850.

* Doneau: first edition; Pinhel: later edition. Doneau was a French humanist jurist and scholar. A worthy antagonist of Cujas, he applied the latest philological methods to Roman law and attempted to organize its texts in a systematic fashion. A staunch Calvinist, he fled France after the St. Bartholomew's Night Massacre. He went on to become a professor at the Universities of Heidelberg and Leiden, where his teaching and numerous studies made a tremendous contribution to the promotion of Roman law in the Netherlands. *Commentarii ad Titulum Digestorum de Verborum Obligationibus* is one of his principal works. It is a treatise on Book 45 of Justinian's *Digest*, which deals with contracts and other obligations. Later editions were published in 1599 and 1622. Our copy is bound to Pinhel's distinguished commentary on Book VI, Title 60 of Justinian's *Code*, which addresses the inheritance and succession of maternal property (or property through a family's maternal side). It also considers this topic according to Spanish and Portuguese civil law. Originally published in 1557, it went through several issues and editions throughout Europe, the final published in Frankfurt in 1614. Neither imprint listed in Adams.



* Jurisdictione, second and final edition; Opuscula, first edition. This volume collects two scarce titles on Roman law. Gentili, a brother of Alberico Gentili, was an eminent law professor and legal scholar. Held in high esteem all over Europe, his fame probably surpassed that of his brother during his lifetime. As indicated by its title, De Jurisdictione is a study of jurisdiction, more specifically, legal authority and power. Its first edition was published in 1601. Doneau, or Donellus, was a French humanist jurist and scholar. An antagonist of Cujas, his only real peer, he applied the latest philological methods to Roman law and attempted to organize its texts in a systematic fashion. Derived from a manuscript owned by Gentili, Doneau's Opuscula is a collection of writings. Most of these deal with the Codex Justinianus. Later editions were published in 1609, 1766 and 1768. OCLC locates 2 copies of the 1613 edition of Jurisdictione in North America (Harvard Law School, Yale Law School), 2 copies of the 1613 edition of Opuscula (Boston College Law School, Stanford University).



* First edition. With indexes. Jacques Godefroy, son of Denis, was a jurist and legal philologist who edited the *Quatuor Fontes Juris Civilis*, a collection of ante-Justinian texts that comprised a reconstruction of the Twelve Tables, and a great edition and commentary on the *Theodosian Code* (1665). The well-esteemed *Opera Juridica* and the *Manual Juris* (1645) are his other principal works.



First published in 1664, *Digressiones Justinianeae* went through eight editions, the final in 1721. More an essay collection than a treatise, it collects his thoughts on a variety of Roman law topics. He also discusses legal pedagogy and the work of his contemporaries and near-contemporaries, such as Grotius and Hobbes. These latter sections are especially interesting because they show what a learned contemporary thought of their work when it was new. They are similar in many regards to reviews in learned journals or publications like the *New York Review of Books*.

It is divided into four books, the Institutes, Digest, Code and Novels. The Code contains the laws in force during Justinian's reign. It is divided into 12 books. Book 1 deals with ecclesiastical law, the sources of law, and the duties of high officials. Books 2-8 deal with private law. Book 9 deals with criminal law. Books 10-12 deal with administrative law. It received a great deal of commentary during the medieval and early modern eras. That of Denis Godefroy was influential well into the twentieth century. 

Rediscovered during the late Middle Ages, it became the standard textbook of Roman law. The main text of our 1501 imprint is accompanied by Accorso's great *Glossa Ordinaria* (or *Magistralis*). A Professor of Law at Bologna and a leading figure in the revival of classical jurisprudence, Accorso examined every extant note and commentary when he prepared his epochal edition of Justinian's *Institutes*, *Digest* and *Code*. 





This collection of legal texts begins with the first appearance of a revised edition, with original commentary by the Dutch jurist Agylaeus, of Gregor Haloander's complete translation of the *Novels*, one of the four components of the *Corpus Juris Civilis*. This is followed by a group of legal texts from other sources edited with commentary by Agylaeus, including: *De Indulgentia Tributariorum Reliquorum*, *Tiberii Imperatoris de Divinis Domibus Constitutio*, *Imperatoris Leonis Augusti Novellae Constitutiones*, *Imperatoris de Novis Operibus Constituio*, *Eodem Interprete*. He also includes Haoloander's version of the Apostolic Canons of Pope Clement I. Agylaeus dedicated this work to Queen Elizabeth I. His choice of a Protestant monarch probably reflected his personal circumstances at that time. He had recently been charged with heresy at the court of Brabant because of comments he published about the Bible and the sacraments. Rather than appear before the court he fled to Germany. He may have intended to continue his flight into England. A year after he published the present work, he requested permission to return, which was granted after he paid a fine and made a confession to the inquisitor fidei. A few years later he moved to the Netherlands and became a supporter and leader of the "Reformed Religion" in the Netherlands. The work is scarce outside of Germany. 



* Second edition by Van Leeuwen. Peck was a professor at the University of Louvain, the school where he studied law, and a judge of the High Court of Mechelen. He was a prolific author; several of his works were standard texts. Verhandelinghe van Handt-Opleggen ende Besetten is a comprehensive treatise on arrest and seizure of property. First published in Latin in 1654 as De Iure Sistendi, it went through several Latin editions into the seventeenth century and was one of the titles included in the Tractatus Universi Juris (1584-1586), the multi-volume anthology of key contemporary legal works edited by Francesco Ziletti under the patronage of Pope Gregory XIII.

The translation edited by Van Leeuwen, possibly the most widely read Dutch jurist of the late-seventeenth and eighteenth centuries, expanded its audience. First published in 1653, it went through seven more editions, the last one in 1784. The Van Leeuwen editions are scarce. OCLC locates 2 in North American law schools, a 1569 edition at Yale and a 1712 edition at UC-Berkeley Law School.

* Later edition. One of the most durable concepts in Roman law, *fideicommissum* involves situations in which something is committed to somebody's trust. It is central to the law concerning testators. First published in 1595, Pellegrini's treatise was a standard work in Northern Italy into the eighteenth century. (Its final edition was published in Venice in 1761.) Not in the *British Museum Catalogue*.



* Later editions. Riva di San Nazarro, a Lombard noble, was a learned jurist and humanist scholar. His many works, all commentaries on aspects of Roman and canon law, went through several editions and were often excerpted and anthologized. The two titles in this volume are from a deluxe series published by Giunta in 1575-1576. (All but the Repertorium are bibliographically distinct.) The Repertorium is an index to this set. In Primam, & Secundam Infortiati is a commentary on the books from the Digest of the Corpus Juris Civilis concerning aspects of personal and family law, such as donations between husband and wife, divorce, curatorship, wills and testaments and trusts and legacies. (The Medieval Glossators divided the 50 books of the Digest into three parts: Digestum Vetus, I-XXIV, Title 2, Infortiatum, XXIV, Title 3-XXXVIII, and Digestum Novum, XXXIX-L. This division was observed into the early modern era.)



* First edition. Rutilio was Italian jurist and humanist. He was also one of the first authors to compile biographies of lawyers. *Iurisconsultorum Vitae* describes the lives and achievements of 77 Roman jurists, from Papirius to Tribonian. Distinguished by its discerning criticism and careful use of sources, the work was well-received. It went through later editions in 1537, 1538, 1539, 1545, 1584 and 1718. All editions are scarce. OCLC locates 2 copies of the first edition in North America (University of Minnesota Law School, Yale).



* Later edition. Vigelius, a professor at Marburg, was one of the leading legal methodists of the late sixteenth century. His *Gerichtsbüchlein* is a comparative collection of cases judged under Roman law, canon law and the customary laws of the Holy Roman Empire. First published in 1588, it went through several editions and issues into the eighteenth century. Our 1635 edition has an attractive copperplate pictorial frontispiece with a depiction of Lady Justice.




* First edition. Zoes was a notable Dutch humanist jurist, later the rector of the University of Louvain. His commentaries on the *Code*, *Digest* and *Institutes* of Justinian and the *Decretals* of Gregory IX were highly regarded works that went through several editions. All editions of *Institutionum* are scarce. No copies of this edition located on OCLC.


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
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
