SUBMISSIONS GUIDELINES

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Length. In general the journal prefers longer rather than shorter submissions and encourages review articles. Shorter submissions will normally appear as “Notes” rather than “Articles”.

Text. In Times Roman, rather than other fonts. Double or single-spaced.

Footnotes. Footnotes at the bottom of the page, and not endnotes. Citation style is set out below.

Citation Style.

Titles should not be translated for major European and Scandinavian languages (Dutch, Flemish, French, German, Italian, Portuguese, Spanish, etc.), but should be given in the original language followed by translation in square brackets for most others (Arabic, Bulgarian, Chinese, Czech, Greek, Hebrew, Polish, Russian, Ukrainian, etc.). If in doubt, inquire.
